Topics for Health Scrutiny during 2003/2004

Staffordshire Health Scrutiny Committee met for the second time on 24 February 2003. At this meeting Members approved a shortlist of proposed topics for its scrutiny.

These topics are as follows:

1. Health Promotion in Schools (and the Health Promoting Schools scheme)
2. Respite Care (and Domiciliary Care)
3. Access to services including transport and availability
4. Health Services for vulnerable children
5. Substance Misuse/Drug Action Team

I attach a copy of the brief discussion that took place regarding these issues at the Annual Conference. You will note that the Staffordshire Health Scrutiny Committee has, in effect, confirmed topics for scrutiny that were put forward by the multi-disciplinary groups. We are aware of the work that is going on in developing task groups to implement the county-wide Community Strategy and will ensure that any work undertaken is fed into these groups, as appropriate.

Members of the Staffordshire Health Scrutiny Committee agreed that I consult with colleagues in health, local authorities and voluntary organisations before developing possible detailed Terms of Reference and work programmes. The purpose of this consultation is particularly to avoid duplication or overlap of work already taking place. If so, it would be helpful if you could answer the following questions in respect of the topics mentioned above.

- 1a. Are you aware of any **current work** that is taking place in any of the topics identified above?
- b. If you do know of work already taking place, could you please let me have either a contact name of the person who is leading on this work and/or a copy of the Terms of Reference?
- c. If you are leading on this work would you consider whether or not health scrutiny could make a contribution? If so it would be helpful if you could provide me with details.
- 2a. Are you aware of any **recent work** ie in the last three years, that has taken place in Staffordshire in any of the topics identified above?
- b. If so, could you please let me have a copy of the Terms of Reference and final report, or give me a contact name or the report author?
- 3a. Are you aware of any **work that is planned** in any of the areas mentioned above?
- b. If so, could you please let me have a contact name of the person who is leading on this work?
4. Have you any further comments to make on the proposed topics?

The Committee has asked that draft Terms of Reference be developed for those topics that, following this consultation, still remain viable, for consideration at its next meeting on 2 April. I apologise for the short timescale, but to allow time for papers to be prepared for this meeting I would be grateful to receive a reply to this by letter by **17 March 2003**.

If I do not receive a response from you I will assume that you are not aware of any research that has taken place, is taking place or is planned in any of the areas mentioned above.

Priority list of topics for Scrutiny by District and Borough Councils

1. Suggested topics for scrutiny by CANNOCK CHASE COUNCIL

1.1 Health funding and priorities

This needs to examine the levels of funding available within the NHS (particularly in the context of quantifying funding priorities) and how this funding is allocated in line with local priorities.

Further examination should also look at other organisations, including the local authority, voluntary organisations to determine how funding is allocated in line with priorities.

With limited resources available it is important that funding is linked to priorities and is used in the most effective and efficient way. Areas of duplication can be identified and recommendations for partnerships development can be made, as appropriate.

1.2. Substance misuse

The drug culture was identified as an important issue that needs to be addressed. Examination of this issue may involve exploring the impact on drug users, their family and the wider community. **Alcohol misuse** also needs to be examined within Cannock Chase.

A review would focus on identifying prevention measures and improvements in the support given to users.

1.3 Health Inequalities

The Government's two priority areas – increasing life expectancy and decreasing infant mortality should be investigated at a local level to identify what is being done to address these inequalities and what further action should be undertaken. The review will need to look at the impact of existing partnerships, the role of Cannock Chase PCT, voluntary organisations and the local authority in tackling these inequalities.

2. Suggested topics for scrutiny by EAST STAFFORDSHIRE BOROUGH COUNCIL

2.1 GP access

To include consideration of the distribution of GPs, urban/rural issues, waiting times for appointments, transport. This subject affects everyone and has high public profile. Access to a GP is often the first point of contact or entry to all other health services.

2.2 Hospital discharge policies

To include looking at cross cutting issues arising from the multi-disciplinary approach to after care, and the relationship to waiting times. This issue has an impact on the

provision of wider caring services, hospital throughput and therefore waiting times and this is a key issue for the public. There are significant cross border issues in East Staffordshire.

2.3 Local partnerships

This would examine what health partnerships exist, what their roles are in regard to impact on health and health services provision, and how effective these arrangements might be. It should also include information sharing and how to better recognise the contribution of the local voluntary sector. It is an important area because of the opportunities for making better use of resources and improving interactivity.

3. Suggested topics for scrutiny by LICHFIELD DISTRICT AND TAMWORTH BOROUGH COUNCILS

Overarching theme: **Partnership working and reducing inequalities**

3.1. Access to mental health services

To include:

Concern regarding mental health waiting times e.g. for children.
Use/priority of services.

3.2. Access to GP services

To include:

Culture/language barriers
Telephone appointments systems
Public transport systems to primary and secondary care including hospital visiting

3.3. Access to continence services and delivery of continence supplies.

To include:

Co-ordination/Communication
Issues of evaluation of the different levels of service which exist

4. Suggested topics for scrutiny by NEWCASTLE-UNDER-LYME BOROUGH COUNCIL

4.1. Services for disabled people and excluded groups and their carers

To look at the other barriers which can prevent access to services such as:-

Physical disability/mobility
Hearing/sight disability
Language or cultural barriers
Inability to read or otherwise access information about services

and at ways to address them

4.2 Joined-up Services

To look at the interface between agencies such as Social Services and the PCT to ensure that there is efficient liaison and no duplication or gaps to service provision.

4.3. Services for the Elderly

5. Suggested topics for scrutiny by SOUTH STAFFORDSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL

5.1 Mental Health Services

To look at the policies of partner organisations and evaluate whether they are making a positive contribution.

5.2. Health Inequalities

To look at the contribution that organisations are making in South Staffordshire to the health inequalities agenda.

5.3 Young People's Access to Health and Social Care Services

Review of health and social care services to see how we can make them more accessible for young people.

6. Suggested topics for scrutiny by STAFFORD BOROUGH COUNCIL

6.1. Ill health prevention/health promotion/public involvement

More ill health prevention/more health promotion/collaborative working/public involvement and co-ordinated approach.

6.2 Physical access/transport

Need to remove physical barrier to access services (Government policy/transport services/location/building design etc.) Consider the impact on other agencies.

6.3 Co-ordinated approach

Need to ensure partnerships work effectively. Information sharing, need to recognise the contribution of the local voluntary sector.

7. Suggested topics for scrutiny by STAFFORDSHIRE MOORLANDS DISTRICT COUNCIL

7.1. Access to Services

To include the full range of access for services or a given area e.g. availability of services, nature of service, transport, out of hours services.

7.2. Communications

To look at the network of health information available for residents and between residents and professionals with a view to identifying what exists, gaps, overlap and improving clarity of responsibility.

1.2 Members will be aware that as published in Digest Number 45, the Cabinet decided on 4 March 2003 the following:-

a contribution of £74,500 be offered towards the cost of the Gnosall Flood Alleviation Scheme using the Watercourses and Flood Defence provision of £40,000 in the 2002/03 Capital Programme with the remaining balance being met from the £40,000 provision for public conveniences for 2003/04.

The County Council anticipates that this will allow work to commence this spring.

To advise the Committee of current progress following consideration of the Called In item relating to Kerbside Collection Trial for Garden Waste which was considered at the meeting on 9 January 2003.

1 Detail

- 1.1 Members will recall that at the last meeting of the Committee, Councillor Mrs E Kidney, Cabinet Member Environment and the Head of Environmental and Health Services, reported on the decision made by the Department for the Environment Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) not approve the Council's application for funding in relation to the Council's trial Garden Waste Collection Service. The Committee resolved that "a letter be sent to DEFRA expressing the Council's disappointment with the recent decision bearing in mind this Council's previous and current success in achieving the Government's recycling targets for local authorities."
- 1.2 A copy of a letter sent to DEFRA subsequent to the meeting of the Committee is attached as an **APPENDIX**.
- 1.3 No acknowledgement or other reply has been received to this letter, although Officers have telephoned DEFRA to request whether or not we may expect a response. The verbal advice given in the latest telephone enquiry is that the matter is still receiving consideration and that a reply will be sent to this Council in due course.
- 1.4 Any further information will be reported verbally at the meeting.

Re: National Waste Minimisation and Recycling Fund 2003/2004

I refer to your letter addressed to Mr D W Hadley, Principal Contracts Officer within my Service, dated 4 December 2002 advising as to the decision in relation to bids for funding generally and Stafford Borough Council's in particular.

The outcome of the bidding process was reported to the Council's Environment Scrutiny Committee on 9 January 2003 by the Council's Cabinet Member for Environment, Councillor Mrs E Kidney. It was resolved that - *"a letter be sent to DEFRA expressing the Council's disappointment with the recent decision, bearing in mind this Council's previous and current success in achieving the Government's recycling targets for local authorities."*

Also on the agenda for that Committee was a report setting out this Council's proposals for next financial year's programme to develop a kerbside collection scheme for garden waste from residential properties. The options within this report included proposals for an enhanced scheme serving 11,000 properties in the event that our bid had been successful. However, an alternative option was agreed to continue with a small scale kerbside collection scheme for 1,000 households in the southern area of the Borough but reducing the cost to £15 per household (a trial scheme at £18 per household was undertaken last year). This scheme, even though households pay a subscription fee, still requires a revenue contribution from the Council.

Stafford Borough Council has, in recent years, been very active in developing new recycling services to residents within the Borough and in relation to waste minimisation policies, and fully recognises the need to divert domestic waste from landfill. In this regard our recycling performance for 2001/02 was 11.16%, therefore the Council has already met this Council's statutory recycling target of 10% for 2003/04 ahead of time. We fully expect this performance to be maintained and to improve slightly but it is dependant on kerbside dry recycling only. The Council understands that although our next statutory target is already being met the next subsequent target in 2005/06 of 18% cannot be met unless garden waste is added to our kerbside collection service. This has significant budgetary implications for the Council and the Committee asked me to write expressing their disappointment that no monies have been allocated to Stafford Borough given that they fully support the need for a step change in performance relating to these issues.

Since the third paragraph of your letter of 4 December referred to the possibility of monies being re-allocated in the event of savings being identified within the original bidding process I wonder whether you are yet in a position to advise me whether or not there is any chance of us receiving allocation for 2003/04?

Stafford MarketWard Interest - NilReport of Head of Operations**Purpose of Report**

To update the Scrutiny Committee on progress to date in respect of improvements at Stafford Market.

1 Detail

1.1 The progress to date on the key principals for improvements at Stafford Market are set out below.

1.2 Revised Managements Arrangements

The post of Stafford Markets Co-ordinator was seen as key to achieving the improvements and the new post-holder (Jon Webb) commenced work on 10 March 2003 and will be attending this Committee to outline his work to date.

The Officer/tenant meetings have now met three times and this is proving to be both an essential and useful mechanism for communication and consultation.

1.3 Outdoor Market

A report on the regulatory and policy framework required to enable the proposed outdoor market to proceed in Crabbery Street/Chapel Street, Stafford was approved at Cabinet on 4 March 2003. The timetable necessary to take into account advertising of intent/consultations/obtaining of consents and considering representations means that the earliest date an outdoor market could commence would be mid-September 2003. The timetable is attached as an **APPENDIX**.

1.4 Design Brief

Further work has been carried out on this aspect of improvement, focussing particularly on signage, both internal and external, and building on the Design Brief 'Raising the Game' that has previously been considered by this Committee.

1.5 Six Day Trading

It was always envisaged that this was part of a package of proposals and is, in itself, a major issue for the Market. It was considered appropriate, therefore, that this issue would be progressed further, in consultation with the traders, when the post of Markets Co-ordinator had been filled and as part of the implementation of the overall package involving improved signage and outdoor markets provision intended to increase footfall within the market.

TIMETABLE OF EVENTS FOR PROPOSED OUTDOOR MARKET IN CRABBERY STREET AND CHAPEL STREET

Proposal

The Council proposes to amend its current street trading policy to change the junction of Crabbery Street and Chapel Street into a consent street invoking the powers contained in Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 and to obtain the necessary consents from all interested parties to place stalls upon the Highway to facilitate the market according to Part VIIA of the Highways Act 1980

Where possible the timetable for both procedures is to run in parallel however it is only the street consent procedure under the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act which has to send recommendations to the Council. The procedure relating to placing stalls on the highway under the Highways Act 1980 is referred to Cabinet. Only.

1 Detail

1.1 The Committee has previously drawn up the following programme of business to be considered:-

- 1.2 The Committee decided at its meeting held on 11 July 2002 that the above issues be considered at special meetings of the Committee, as appropriate, and outside agencies be invited to contribute to the meeting.
- 1.3 The Committee has also taken the opportunity to visit a licensed composting site at Shareshill and an “on farm” composting site at Acton, Near Newcastle-Under-Lyme on 25 September 2002, to acquaint Members with the issues involved with green recycling.
- 1.4 At the meeting of the Committee on 3 December 2002 it was decided that the investigation of the effects of telecom masts be incorporated into the Committee’s Business Plan, with all Members of the Council being invited to receive presentations from expert representatives of all sides. However, at the meeting of the Committee on 9 January 2003, it was decided to delete this item from the work programme.
- 1.5 In accordance with Article 6, paragraph 6.3, of the Constitution, the Committee is required to report annually to the Council on its workings and future work programmes.

2 Conclusion

- 2.1 In addition to its regular business, the Committee has considered a wide range of topics and issues, both at regular and special meetings.
- 2.2 Scrutiny of health will continue to be an important and ongoing issue for the Council. This has been recognised by the special arrangements now put in place.
- 2.3 Environment and waste issues will no doubt continue to be important areas for future consideration in whatever format. They raise important issues for the Council, the Borough Community and Key Stakeholders.
- 2.4 It is intended that this report, with the addition of appropriate information concerning the current meeting, be taken to the Council at its meeting on 29 April, as the report back from the Environmental Scrutiny Committee, as referred to in Paragraph 1.5 of this report.
- 2.5 Are there any other matters, the Committee would like to include or comments they would wish to add?
